



Another bream hits the net.

At last some improved weather which has seen some better catches.

The recent Angling Trust winter league final produced some good results after only a few days of warmth. The event was won by the top team Drennan Barnsley Blacks with local sides Daiwa Tackle and Bates and Sensas Hotrods second and third. After concerns that the results would be disastrous the event proved to be a success thanks to all those involved, not least the anglers that sussed out the best sections of the venues to use.

The local rivers and drains have taken longer to improve with very mixed results. However, with very few anglers on the bank it's very difficult to locate the fish and provide encouraging information for members.

With very little recent local rain it's hard to understand why the Ouse and Level have been flowing so hard, a factor which has not helped the action.
